Black people were — 'put in their places'—intimidated, run off and even killed. Armed mobs of angry whites blocked black voters at polling places. Voting gave those 'colored people' too much power!

In 1860s, tricks and viciousness prevailed. Ballot boxes were stolen and destroyed. Black 'elected' officials in the Carolinas, and other southern states were forced from office by armed whites. Mobs routinely murdered with no repercussions. The federal courts at that time couldn't or wouldn't enforce any rights to take part in federal elections; they said voting in local elections wasn't a right guaranteed by the federal government, so it was out of their hands. This gave freedom to those southern states to wreak havoc against black voters.

Tricks

National trickery is a great concern across the country. Fake phone calls went out in some states telling voters they could vote over the phone. In Pennsylvania, billboards are up requiring voters to bring their IDs, although they don't have to. Without question, there is a lot of confusion surrounding this year's election. Why would any state want to be a part of the confusion that could taint an election and deprive the people of their right to vote?

As First Lady, I have seen firsthand what being President really looks like. I've seen how important it is to have a President who doesn't just tell us what we want to hear, but who tells us the truth, even when it's hard — especially when it's hard. And I've seen that when it comes time to make those tough calls, and everyone's urging you to do what's easy, or what polls best, or what gets good headlines, as President, you need to be driven by the struggles, hopes, and dreams of all the people you serve. You need to be committed to lifting up every single American.

So the choice we face in this election is clear: We can go back to the same, failed policies of the past — or we can continue the progress we've made and keep our country moving forward.


